

BIRD TREKS

LOWER RIO GRANDE VALLEY and the extreme SOUTH TEXAS GULF COAST, with a chance for FERRUGINOUS PYGMY-OWL

Dates Monday, 21 February through Wednesday, 2 March 2011: 10 days and 9 nights

We'll visit South Padre Island, beautiful sanctuaries along the Gulf Coast, for songbirds, shorebirds, and seabirds.

Laguna Atascosa, Santa Ana, Anzalduas, Bentsen, and Salineno: oases of native vegetation, home to great birds on the Mexican border.

Many new refuges in the Rio Grande Valley that have become fantastic birding hotspots. We'll also visit a ranch for our best chance at finding a Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl.

21 February - 2 March 2011

Day Agenda

- 1 Plan to arrive in Harlingen Airport by early afternoon. Depending upon how much time we have, we will either go in search of a local rarity, or visit Estero Llano Grande State Park for some great afternoon birding. Our first three nights will be in Harlingen.

- 2 We look forward to a full day of birding in the 45,000-acre Laguna Atascosa NWR, on the inland side of Laguna Madre. We'll look for **Aplomado Falcon, Harris's Hawk, Marbled Godwit, Long-billed Curlew, Sedge Wren, King Rail, and Olive Sparrow**. Thousands of **Redheads** winter here, along with an abundance of other waterfowl. Late in the day we may see **Greater Roadrunner, Plain Chachalaca, Wild Turkey, and Nine-banded Armadillo**, as we have in past years. If recent sightings warrant, we will save time for any one of several small refuges and parks that have become true magnets for rarities. Our second night in Harlingen.

- 3 Our first stop is South Padre Island for rails, raptors, gulls, terns, waterfowl, and shorebirds, including our first **Piping Plovers**. The native plantings at the Convention Center often hold interesting songbirds. Boca Chica will hopefully yield some seabirds, and perhaps **Snowy Plover, Red Knot, and Northern Gannet**. Late in the day we'll look for **Green Parakeet and Red-crowned Parrot**. One year at this time we were happily surprised with a **Tropical Parula!** Our final night in Harlingen.

- 4 Our morning at Santa Ana NWR may produce **Green and Ringed Kingfishers, Least Grebe, Golden-fronted Woodpecker**, and perhaps a **Hook-billed Kite**. Previously we have seen **Bobcat and Texas Coral Snake**. **Clay-colored Thrush and Tropical Parula** have become regular winter residents. After a stop at the refuge visitor center and bookstore, we'll finish the day at Estero Llano Grande

State Park. Because of its varied habitats, Estero Llano Grande has a well-deserved reputation as a superb birding destination. The rangers often know of a **Common Pauraque** on its day roost. Our first of three nights in McAllen.

5 We'll begin our day at the Frontera Audubon Society Refuge in Weslaco. This 15-acre sanctuary is almost over-flowing with birds. The feeding stations are well-maintained and water is provided for drinking and bathing. Many of the Rio Grande specialties can be found here, including **Green Jay**, **Plain Chachalaca**, **Great Kiskadee**, and **Clay-colored Thrush**. Past visits have yielded rarities that include **Crimson-collared Grosbeak**, **White-throated Robin**, **Elegant Trogon**, and **Roadside Hawk**. We'll have another late day opportunity to look for **Green Parakeet** and **Red-crowned Parrot**. Second night in McAllen.

6 Bentsen-Rio Grande Valley State Park lies on the Mexican border. Target birds at Bentsen include lots of **Plain Chachalacas**, **Altamira Oriole**, **Eastern Screech-Owl**, and **Common Pauraque**. **Clay-colored Thrush** and **Blue Bunting** are sometimes found here. Once again, feeding stations and water create a wonderful attraction to a variety of birds. Last year's hot birds included a **Rose-throated Becard** and the first **Bare-throated Tiger-Heron** ever seen north of the Rio Grande. Later in the day we will be at Anzalduas County Park, again on the border at the Rio Grande. This is a reliable area for **Northern Beardless-Tyrannulet**. A large mowed field usually contains some **Sprague's Pipits**. We can almost always find some **mixed warbler flocks** in the live oak trees and perhaps a **Green** or **Ringed Kingfisher** over the river. Final night in McAllen.

7 We'll spend one more morning in the McAllen area, visiting Chihuahua Woods, Weslaco Water Treatment Plant, and McAllen Sewage Ponds. Chihuahua Woods will once again give us a nice variety of species because of its varied habitats. The two treatment plants are excellent for **waterfowl** and **shorebirds**, with quite a few that we have not yet seen. We will work our way up the Rio Grande, with our final three nights in Rio Grande City.

8 A drive west will take us to the Falcon Dam area for our full day of birding. We will attempt to see **Black-tailed Gnatcatcher**, **Scaled Quail**, and **Hooded Oriole**. Salineno is often good for **Altamira** and **Audubon's Orioles**, **Ladder-backed Woodpecker**, **Common Ground-Dove**, **Zone-tailed Hawk**, and **Gray Hawk**. There may be **Red-billed Pigeon** and **Groove-billed Ani**. Falcon State Park should produce a few **Vermilion Flycatchers**, **Pyrrhuloxia**, **Nashville Warbler**, and **Greater Roadrunner**. And perhaps last year's **Roadside Hawk** will return. Second night in Rio Grande City.

- 9 San Ignacio is the most reliable location for **White-collared Seedeater** in the Valley. And even though we will see many other species, the **seedeater** is our target bird for the day. It won't be easy, but we'll give it our best. Last year a single **Brown Jay** was frequenting a feeder in San Ignacio. It was the only known Brown Jay north of the Rio Grande in the past few years. We'll hope that it is still there, and perhaps has even attracted a flock. Our final night in Rio Grande City.
- 10 We'll work our way toward **Harlingen** and our afternoon flights home. We will bird as time allows, the end of ten wonderful days in the Rio Grande Valley.

PLEASE NOTE

This tour concentrates on the refuges of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, from the Gulf Coast as far upriver as San Ignacio. Unlike the January tour, this one does not include a boat ride to search for Whooping Cranes in Aransas Bay. Instead, we will visit a private ranch in an attempt to see a Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl. This may help you to decide which tour you would rather take.
